Date	#	Species	Cause
11.09.2023	40	Gråmåse, Herring gull (Larus argentatus)	During delousing, the roof net was partly removed from a cage when the weather rapidly got bad so fast that reinstalling the roof net was not possible. When the feeding was restarted, many herring gulls was caught in the roof net that was only partly in place on the cage. It cannot be ruled out that the herring gulls could be affected by the ongoing bird flu pandemic in the area, causing them to try to find easily accessible food. It may also partly explain the large number of dead birds as result of the incident.

Date	#	Species	Cause
11.05.2023	1	Vågehval (Minke whale, Balaenoptera acutorostrata)	The whale got into a cage, and the Directorate of Fisheries decided that the whale had to be euthanized.
